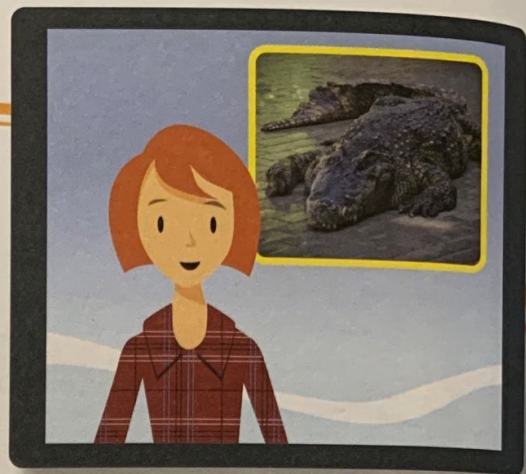
5 Officers from the Department of Conservation **were sent** to look for her, without success. Please call the police on 2824 5000 if you have seen Sally.

passive voice in the simple past tense

past tense

Active: The foreign correspondent did an exclusive interview.

Passive: The exclusive interview **was done** by the foreign correspondent.

Use the passive voice when you want to **focus on an action**.

past tense

Active: The volcanic eruptions did not destroy the buildings.

Passive: The buildings **were not destroyed** by the volcanic eruptions.

Form the passive voice in the past tense like this:

I/He/She/It	was	(not)	photographed. (past participle)
You/We/They	were
